**State-Funded SSI Replacement Programs**

This table lists the state-funded programs that provide cash assistance to immigrants who are not eligible for coverage under the federal Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program. In many other states, General Assistance and similar programs may fill in some of the gaps for immigrants who are ineligible for federally funded Supplemental Security Income (SSI). The benefit levels, however, are generally much lower than those provided by SSI, and other restrictions and time limits may apply. *Last updated JUNE 2024*

STATE	ELIGIBLE IMMIGRANTS
California	“Qualified” immigrants, PRUCOLs, victims of trafficking, U visa applicants, and U visa holders who are ineligible for federal SSI. Eligibility for this program may be affected by deeming.
Hawaii	“Qualified” and other lawfully present immigrant seniors can receive assistance under the Aid to the Aged, Blind and Disabled (AABD) program, which provides up to \$406 per month for individuals. “Qualified” and other lawfully present immigrants with disabilities can receive General Assistance, which also provides up to \$406 per month.
Illinois	<p>“Qualified” immigrants who were lawfully residing in the U.S. before Aug. 22, 1996, were not receiving SSI on that date, are 65 or older, and are determined ineligible for SSI because they do not have a disability. Eligibility for this program may be affected by deeming.</p> <p>Refugees, persons granted asylum or withholding of deportation/removal, Cuban and Haitian entrants, Amerasian immigrants, Iraqi or Afghan special immigrant visa holders, and trafficking survivors who would be eligible for SSI but for the expiration of the seven-year eligibility period can receive up to 90 percent of the maximum SSI payment amount per month under Illinois’s Aid to the Aged, Blind, and Disabled Program.</p>
Maine	“Qualified” immigrants and PRUCOLs who are ineligible for federal SSI. Benefit levels for individuals are equal to the federal SSI and state SSI supplement.
New Hampshire	“Qualified” immigrants who entered the U.S. on or before Aug. 22, 1996, and those who entered after Aug. 22, 1996, who have been in “qualified” immigrant status for 5 years. Refugees, asylees, Cuban/Haitian entrants, Amerasian immigrants and persons granted withholding of deportation/removal are eligible without regard to their date of entry into the U.S.
Washington	Lawfully present immigrants, including DACA grantees, and survivors of crime who have filed or are preparing to file for T or U status or for asylum may be eligible for the Aged, Blind, or Disabled (ABD) cash assistance program. The benefit level is \$450 per month for individuals.

**Key Terms Used in Table**

**“Qualified” immigrants** – are: (1) lawful permanent residents (LPRs); (2) refugees, asylees, persons granted withholding of deportation/removal, conditional entry (in effect prior to Apr. 1, 1980), or paroled into the U.S. for at least one year; (3) Cuban/Haitian entrants (as defined in 45 CFR § 401.2); and (4) battered spouses and children with a pending or approved (a) self-petition for an immigrant visa, or (b) immigrant visa filed for a spouse or child by a U.S. citizen or LPR, or (c) application for cancellation of removal/suspension of deportation, whose need for benefits has a substantial connection to the battery or cruelty (parent/child of such battered child/spouse are also “qualified”); (5) survivors of trafficking and their derivative beneficiaries who have obtained a T visa or whose application for a T visa sets forth a prima facie case; and (6) Citizens of Micronesia, Marshall Islands, and Palau who reside in the U.S. pursuant to a Compact of Free Association (COFA).

**“PRUCOL” or permanently residing in the U.S. under color of law** – is not an immigration status, but a benefit eligibility category. The term, which generally means that U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services is aware of a person’s presence, but has no plans to deport/remove them, has been interpreted differently depending on the benefit program and jurisdiction.

**Deeming** – in some cases, a sponsor’s income and/or resources may be added to the immigrant’s in determining eligibility. Exemptions from deeming may apply.
